## Short Essay 3

## Assignment Description:

In *This Film Is Not Yet Rated* (2006), documentary filmmaker Kirby Dick attempts, with the help of a private investigator, to uncover the identities of the Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) ratings board members and learn more about the process by which American films are rated. Largely praised by film critics as an entertaining, if at times silly, look into an otherwise mysterious process, *This Film Is Not Yet Rated* takes on a variety of issues relating to this course including, but not limited to:

- The profit motive driving media production;
- The proliferation of violence in American media (though film specifically is considered here);
- The callousness with which sex is often represented in American media (again, film specifically is considered);
- Sexism and heterosexism;
- Media effects.

In your paper of 2-3 typed, double-spaced pages, you will select what you believe are the <u>two (2)</u> most important issues raised in the film with respect to the way the ratings system is implemented (you can select from the above examples, but you are not limited to them) and discuss *why* these issues are important, drawing from <u>both</u> specifics from the film <u>as well as</u> course materials. You cannot select "wrong" issues around which to write your paper, however, you will be graded on your ability to develop and support your argument using evidence from the film and this course.

The paper should have a thesis statement that presents the two issues around which your paper focuses. The thesis statement should be supported with evidence. <u>At least three (3)</u> assigned materials (online articles, textbook, films, supplemental readings, etc.) for this course must be used to support your claims.

A properly formatted works cited list/bibliography is required, following either APA or Chicago Manual of Style.

**Please note:** the above issues are fairly broad. You will need to narrow them down appropriately to fit the constraints of this assignment.

The assignment will be graded out of 100 points. The assignment should be submitted via Blackboard *before* class on Thursday, April 21 and adhere to the following format:

- Typed in 12 pt. Times New Roman Font (or equivalent)
- Double spaced
- Include page numbers
- Pledged [Write "I pledge" either at the top or at the very end of your paper.]
- A title that is creative (and not "Paper 3")
- "Normal" margins (approximately 1 1.1 inches)
